

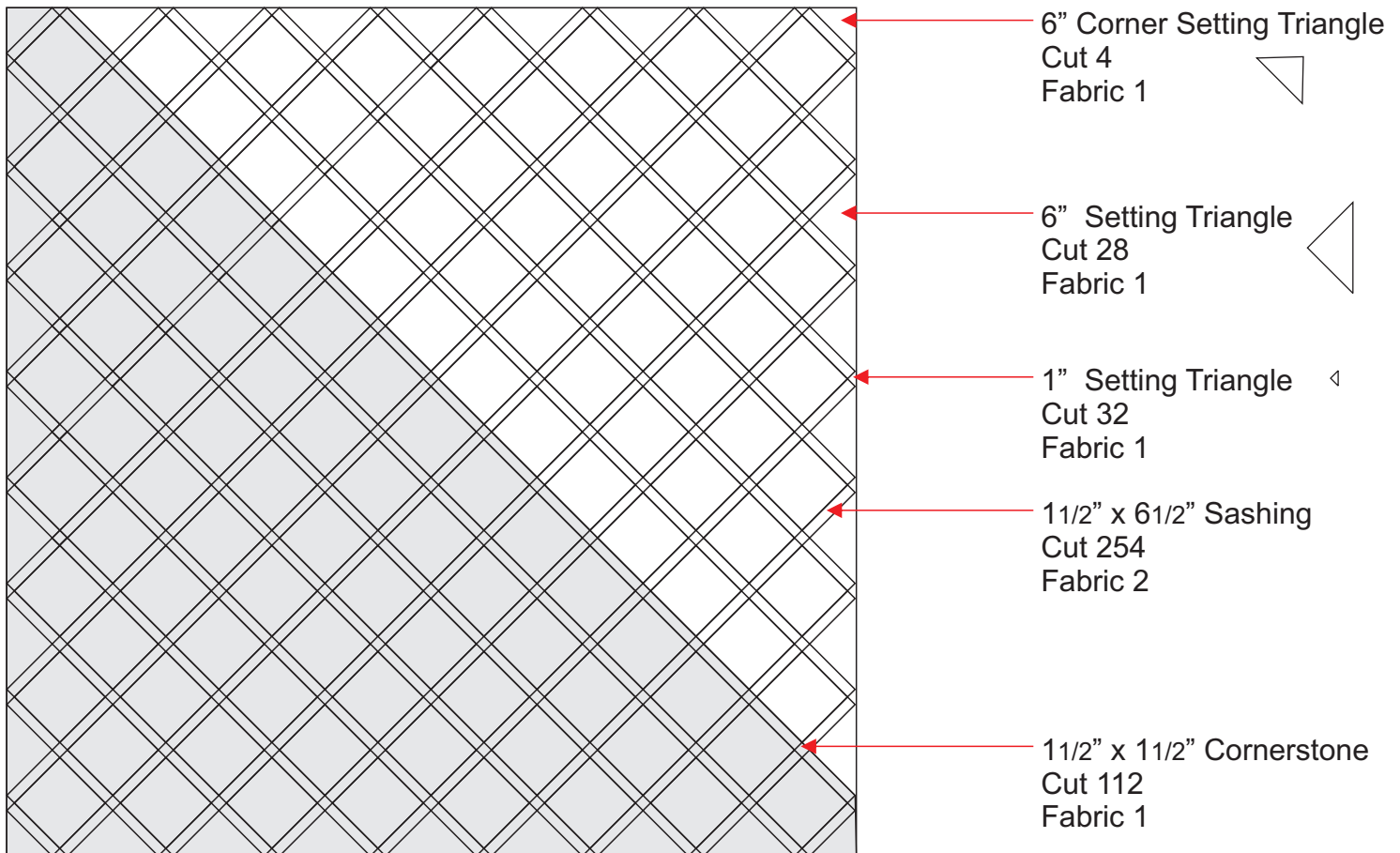


Congratulations on completing the 113 blocks

I hope you have enjoyed making the blocks, made a dent in your stash and acquired some new skills along the way.

I used my Adjustable 2" to 6" Setting Triangle and for the Corner Setting Triangles, I used my Adjustable Corner Setting 2" to 6" Triangle.

Note: You can use your Adjustable Half Square Triangle as a Setting Triangle BUT you must remember to change the bias position from that shown on the tool. The same applies for the small Setting Triangles, you can use your Miniature Half Square Triangle. Follow the bias directions below.



Sew in rows.

Sew rows of Blocks - Press towards the sashing

Sew rows of Sashing and Cornerstones - Press towards the cornerstones

Join rows together - nesting seams - Press towards the sashing.

As this is a very large quilt, it is easier to sew the quilt together if you work in 2 halves.

Remember to pin.



Constructing the Quilt on Point

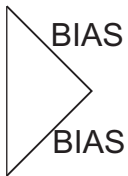
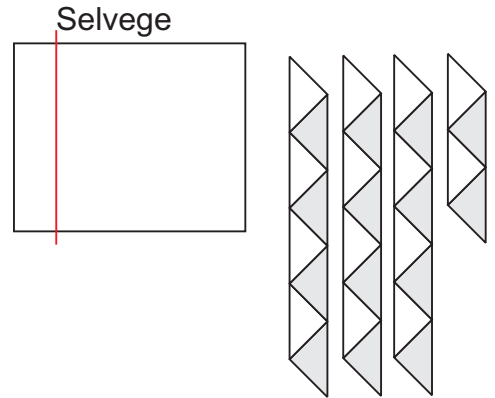
Setting Triangles

Cut 28 x 6" Setting Triangles

Set the Adjustable Setting Triangle at 6

Adjust your ruler to measure the clear portion of the Setting Triangle with fabric folded in 4 cut 4 strips on straight of grain.

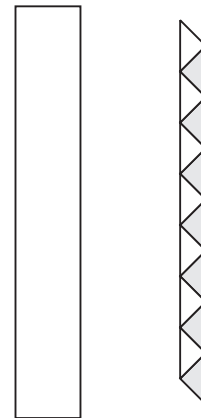
Cross cut using the Setting Triangle to yield 28 setting triangles. It is important to cut strips on the straight of grain to ensure that the BIAS is in the correct place.



Cut 32 x 1" Setting Triangles

Adjust your ruler to measure the clear portion of the Setting Triangle with fabric folded in 4 - cut 1 strip on straight of grain.

1 strip (width of fabric) will yield 64, 1" Setting Triangles.



Corner Setting Triangles

Set the Corner Setting Triangle at 6

Adjust your ruler to measure the clear portion of the setting triangle. Cut strip on the bias large enough to cut 4 Corner Setting Triangles.
